Dr. Veit Heiduschka received the Prix EURIMAGES 2007 (together with Margaret Menegoz), and the honorary award European Achievement in World Cinema went to Christoph Waltz in 2015.

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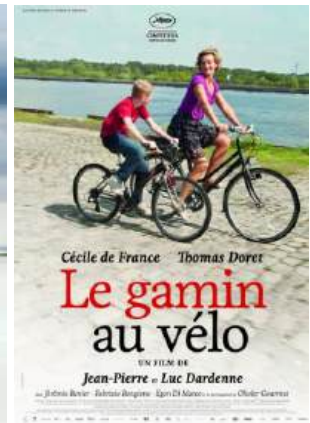
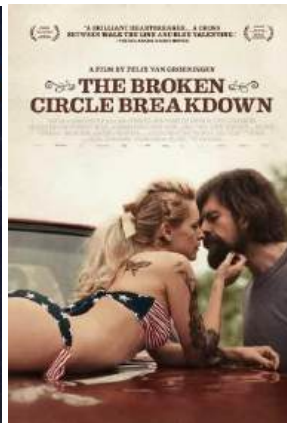

Belgian films and filmmakers have won a total of **17 European Film Awards**, starting in 1991 with **TOTO LE HÉROS** by Jaco Van Dormael (European Screenwriter, Cinematographer and Young Film), honouring performances by actor André Wilms (1992 in LA VIE DE BOHÈME) and actress Veerle Baetens (2013 in **THE BROKEN CIRCLE BREAKDOWN**), debut films (**OXYGEN** by Hans Van Nuffel in 2011 and **GIRL** by Lukas Dhont in 2018), short films (**DEATH OF A SHADOW** by Tom Van Avermaet in 2012 and **MY UNCLE TUDOR** by Olga Lucovnicova in 2021) and the LUX Audience Award 2023 for **CLOSE** by Lukas Dhont.



Among the many Belgian nominations were **MAN BITES DOG** by Rémy Belvaux, André Bonzel and Benoît Poelvoorde and Jan Declair in DAENS (both in 1993), **THE BRAND NEW TESTAMENT** by Jaco Van Dormael (2015), as well as **VINCENT AND THE END OF THE WORLD** by Christophe van Rompaey and **KING OF THE BELGIANS** by Jessica Woodworth & Peter Brosens (both in 2017).

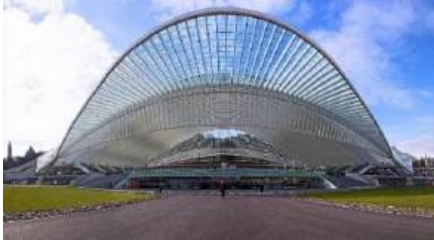

Another documentary was nominated in 2017: THE GOOD POSTMAN by Tonislav Hristov.
